The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick

Saturday, September 26 – 4:30 p.m. Mass
Sunday, September 27 – all Masses



Who should be anointed?

Anyone who has a serious illness or the debilitation of old age.

When should they be anointed?

As soon as the illness is diagnosed and anytime it significantly worsens. Anointing is the sacrament of the sick so we can cope with illness and be helped to heal.

How long do the effects of the sacrament last?

There is no “expiration date” for the sacrament.

Isn't this sacrament supposed to be given when somebody is dying?

The ritual book for the Sacrament of Anointing says, “The reception of the Eucharist as viaticum, food for the passage through death to eternal life, is the sacrament proper to the dying Christian...**The sacrament of anointing should be celebrated at the beginning of a serious illness.**” {#175, emphasis added} The sacrament for the dying is Holy Communion. This doesn't mean that a dying person can't be anointed, but the anointing should happen long before that moment. It should never be the case that receiving the Anointing of the Sick is put off until the person is dying.

Also, remember that a priest may not be available when someone is dying.

As we celebrate this sacrament as part of the weekend Masses, those wishing to be anointed will need to sit in the front pews or along the aisles if they cannot stand around the sanctuary for the anointing.

Our priests are always happy to visit a person at home or in a care facility to celebrate the sacrament for them. Our Catholic hospitals have priests who visit at least several days a week to celebrate this sacrament. Do not hesitate to ask the hospital staff for the sacrament when someone is hospitalized.

Descriptions of Some Activities

Adult Faith Formation

The opportunities for our adults to deepen their understanding of the faith continue to expand. We feel this is a very important part of parish ministry. Last fall there were two lecture series on Thursdays, one in the morning and one in the evening. The morning series had a good turnout of about 25 people. It was on the major stories of Genesis (Adam and Eve/Creation, Cain and Abel, Noah, Abraham/Isaac, Jacob, Joseph). The evening struggled to attract people; it focused on the Virtues. During Lent we took on as a parish the Living the Eucharist program. It was successful for the first year involving about 150 people in small groups and family sessions. While the Living the Eucharist program was going on Mr. Kovatch gave a morning lecture series on the New Testament (Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, Acts, Letters). And this summer he began a *Catholicism 101* series as a refresher of basic things of the faith.

RCIA

We had 9 people come through the process this year, 8 Candidates (those already baptized in another denomination) and 1 Catechumen (who sought baptism). We will continue to work with them to be active one way or another in the Church.

Youth Ministry

It is a small and struggling group, but Mr. Kovatch thinks there is a cohesiveness starting to form among the kids. The Volleyball league they participated in during January really gave it substance. Other events included: Movie Nights (Moneyball, Jurassic Park), praying the steps in Mt. Adams on Holy Thursday night, a Field Day last summer, feeding the homeless one day in Over-the-Rhine, and Gospel reflection meetings. It seems to be gaining traction, and we look for more teens to participate next year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

By the Finance Council

The 2014/2015 fiscal year for the parish closed on June 30. This year Sunday giving showed a \$32,000 decrease over the prior year and \$120,000 under budget. Sunday collections totaled \$1,115,165. The average contribution of the 1,187 giving families was \$1,016, up about \$20 per household over last year. The parish ended the year with an \$18,840 deficit. The major factor contributing to the deficit was reduction in Sunday giving. Of our registered school families 15% of them gave nothing to our Sunday collection. The average donation of our school families was \$831.

Again this year, in an attempt to more accurately account for the cost of operating our school, we have made the following adjustment to the financial statements presented below. Portions of parish office staff salaries and benefits have been allocated to the school to cover cost of the accounting, payroll processing, tuition collection and other services performed by the parish staff for the school. This was done as a percentage of revenue from parish to school. Also \$15,000 is allocated to the school for their use of the parish gym and church hall. This adjustment was also made in the Budget statement presented below. These are standard adjusts made each year. The parish subsidy to the school this year was \$44,533.

The Festival, Holiday Bonanza & Fish Fry proceeds are not in the parish operating budget and are not allocated for parish operating but for capital improvements. 2014 Festival proceeds were \$51,276; the 2014 Holiday Bonanza made \$16,352 and the 2015 Fish Fry \$51,276. These proceeds were used for the following capital projects:

- o School Boiler - \$19,300;
- o Gym & Parish Ctr lobby AC & Heat replacement- \$51,700

- School Tuck pointing -\$7,960
- Light bulb replacement in Church - \$2,830

Without the support of these fundraisers these items would be in the operating budget, therefore impacting tuition rates. We are very grateful for these successful events and appreciate our volunteers.

St. James Parish has funds on deposit at the Archdiocese of Cincinnati totaling \$278,790.01.

The funds are composed of:

- St. James School Restricted Fund [school] - \$100,350;
- Koch Memorial Fund [school] - \$38,982;
- Technology Savings [school] - \$86,389.72;
- Blue Ribbon Permanent Education Endowment Fund [school] - \$46,473.50;
- Mission Certificates - \$6,595.

These funds are held for specific purposes noted and are **not** available for the operation of the parish.

We still have parish debt to report due to the church renovation and school window replacement. The church renovation did exceed the budgeted amount. In the fall 2011 the parish had a pledge drive for these projects and you very generously pledged the \$1,500,000 goal. As of this print we have collected \$1,392,851. We have around \$13,000 left to collect. Thank you to everyone who is faithfully paying those pledges; we need them all. As of now (July 2015) our parish debt is \$56,818. As you can see we do not have enough outstanding pledges to repay this debt so if you can make an additional payment or maybe you could not make a pledge at the time any donation would be helpful in our debt reduction.

We want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who financially supports our parish. As the Finance Council, we work hard to use your gifts to the Lord responsibly for the good of the Church. We hope that you will continue to share your blessings in the Stewardship Commitment for the coming year. **Thank you in the name of the Lord.**

2015/2016 Operating Budget

The operating budget for the 2015/2016 fiscal year projects balanced revenues and expenditures of \$3,559,855, a decrease of 0.2% over the current year's budget.

Revenues:

Sunday and holyday giving is projected at \$1,235,000, with no increase from this year's budget. There is no increase because when the budget was prepared in February 2015 our Sunday giving was under budget. The parish needs on average \$1050 from every giving family to meet this budgeted amount. This figure is based on 1168 families giving something in 2014-2015.

School revenues are projected to be \$2,239,055 with tuition at \$1,887,405. The major difference being the Jon Peterson Scholarship the school is receiving, but the expenses are also reflected since this income is used to provide the additional services. The hardship allowance is projected at \$75,000 and is included in the parish budget. Included in this amount, there is also money generated by the school envelopes included in our Sunday envelope package and the ESAP money. The school projection is based upon enrollment of 530. The budgeted enrollment figure for last year was 560, and the current enrollment actually was 570.

Tuition was increased 2.8% this year the same as last year. The tuition for one child in the school will be \$3,565. For families who pay their entire tuition before August 1st a 3% discount will be given. Tuition for one child with this discount is \$3,408 a savings of \$107.

Expenditures:

Parish - The parish budget is decreasing by \$17,765 or 2% from this year's budget. This is due to tighter budgeting on actual expenses and eliminating expenses that do not occur every year such as religion textbooks.

School - The school budget is projected to decrease \$42,495 from this past year's budget. With the decrease in enrollment staff positions were eliminated or reduction of hours, reducing the amount needed for teacher salaries. Teachers will receive a slight increase in addition to their step increase. The technology fund is budgeted at \$20,480 with an additional \$11,000 for technology supplies.

Maintenance - The total maintenance budget for is \$527,539, a slight decrease of \$1,200. We continue to take advantage of cost saving rates and were working with other parishes of the Archdiocese to buy in groups to get better rates. Capital allocations are included at \$20,000, the same as last year. Most major repairs and improvements are covered by holiday bonanza, fish fry and festival profits. There are no holiday bonanza, fish fry or festival proceeds incorporated in the operating budget.

This budget was approved by Finance & Pastoral Councils.

Doors, Doors and More Doors

About six or seven months ago somebody asked me where the confessional was in church. They had plans to receive the Sacrament of Penance but couldn't find the confessional. I thought it was obvious, but it isn't.

Because of the person's question, I realized that almost all the doors in church look alike. (And there are a lot of doors.) The doors to the sacristies, to the storage rooms, to the janitor's closets, to the bathrooms, to the confessional are all alike. The only thing that sets them apart is that the doors to the bathrooms have signs near them saying "Restroom."

In all the discussions during the renovation of the church, we did not consider enhancing the door to the confessional or making it more prominent. That was an oversight. Now we are fixing that.

Soon a plaque will be placed on the door to the confessional that clearly, I hope, marks it as place to celebrate God's mercy. (See the picture to the right.)

The plaque will be a trompe l'oeil painting, to make it look like a wood carving. White tulips surround the main features because they symbolize forgiveness. The central figures come from the Gospel of John 20:19-23. The gold cross in the center symbolizes the Resurrected Jesus who tells his disciples "Receive the Holy Spirit (the white dove in the plaque). Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them and whose sins you retain are retained." The crossed keys have been the traditional symbol of the Sacrament of Penance and indicate the Church's power to forgive sins.

It's important that we clearly identify the place where we celebrate God's mercy. Pope Francis has called upon the Church to celebrate a special Holy Year beginning December 8 to highlight God's mercy. We will probably have special pilgrimages and prayer services to celebrate the Holy Year. Every week, though, we celebrate the Lord's mercy in this great sacrament. It's an ordinary part of our Catholic lives to go to confession and feel God's mercy in our hearts. And the place where we do that should be easily recognized as we come into the church.

Our door plaque which celebrates "God's mercy endures forever" should be installed in the next few weeks. Maybe it will draw all of us to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance more often, now that we can find the confessional more easily.
