



### Our Media by Father Nolker

How often don't we see somebody with their eyes glued to their computer? If you ask somebody where their information came from on any topic, they will most often tell you it was the internet. Electronic media is a standard part of life today. People can do without the morning newspaper but they freak out if the internet is down.



In the age of the “new evangelization” in the Church, a focus has been to strengthen the presence of the Catholic Church in the electronic media. When I search something on the internet, I find an unbelievable number of websites that say they are the truth bearers on the religious topic. Unfortunately, that isn't true and that can diminish the value of everything in the electronic world of religion.

An article I recently read mourned the loss of so many print sources for Catholic news and teaching. Diocesan newspapers, like our own *Catholic Telegraph*, have either gone to monthly or quarterly editions, if they haven't closed altogether (like the Toledo diocesan paper did a few months ago.) This article said, “Catholic print media is bleeding.” It continued, “The irony is that polling data continues to show that Catholics trust their own media and particularly rely on its print incarnations.”

Let me share with you some data from the polling the article reported. It comes from the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate, which is an independent research group but one that works closely with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. It is one of the most highly respected groups for Catholic information. It found that 26 percent of self-identified Catholics had read a print diocesan publication in the last 3 months. Only 3 percent reported reading anything religious on line. 18 percent of adult Catholics usually read a print Catholic paper or magazine each month.

It went on to tell us that of those who attend Mass weekly, 55 percent read a print version of their diocesan publication. Of course, older Catholics are more inclined to read a print version, but 22 percent of millennials read print copies and only 4 percent of millennials read Catholic material on line. When dealing with the issue of trust, 69 percent of practicing Catholics trust official Catholic sources more than secular media of any kind.

I don't have any doubt that more and more of us will get our religious information electronically. Some probably don't know what is available and those who have tried it have found such divergent material, each purporting to be the truth, that it makes it confusing. Not everybody has found the Vatican website or that of the U.S. Conference of Bishops or the Catholic News Service. Much of the print material is sent directly into your homes, like this issue of *Parish Life*, and that may make a difference, too, because we see print materials on the table silently calling us to read it.

Now I come to the reason I wrote this article. *Parish Life* can exist for a number of reasons. 1) It could be where parish organizations publicize their past and upcoming activities. 2) It could be where staff members tell you what is coming up in their particular area of ministry. 3) It could be a place to explore important Catholic issues with more educational/informative articles. All of these are good and important reasons to continue this publication. The reason I wrote this article is to ask for direction from you about what you want to see in *Parish Life*. Do the parishioners want the parish staff to explore Church teachings or practices, making it a tool for adult education? Do you want us to focus on reporting parish activities, past and future? What do you want this publication to cover? Since print material is still important for Catholics, what do you expect in *Parish Life*? Send me a note to tell me what you think.

## Grief and the Holidays by Fr. Tozzi

Family and friends together.... decorated homes.... good food.... the upcoming holidays of Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's evoke powerful emotions. Usually those emotions are good but if you've had someone special in your life die it can seem like mandatory organized torture. Here are a few ideas for dealing with grief and the holidays:

1. **Accept that things are different.** Things won't be like they were before and you are going to be OK. However, you'll have to figure out a "new normal." Have reasonable expectations. What traditions do you want to keep?
2. **Decorate** your home but feel free to scale it back. While you might not feel like having much decorations up, it's still good to have at least some small decoration in your home. Perhaps you have something that holds fond memories for you. Maybe you need some things that don't.
3. **Go to holiday events** but give yourself permission to leave if you need to. Going out and socializing can actually help with grief, even if it's just for a little bit. People will understand if you leave early and if they don't, then tough.
4. **People don't always know that what they are saying may hurt you.** Some people don't know what to say when faced with loss and grief. They may say something odd or may say something like "It's nice when we can all get together." Your heart reminds you that you're not all together, you're missing someone. They didn't mean it that way. The same concept goes for happy couples and families; it may be difficult for you to be around really happy people but they are enjoying themselves and creating nice memories. It's ok if you're feeling sad and they're happy.
5. **Grief ambushes you.** When you're grieving the littlest things can make you cry. Holidays have a lot of aspects that bring up memories. You may be in a store and the Christmas songs are playing....and you break down crying from seemingly nowhere. There's nothing wrong with you; that's just how grief works.
6. **Remember them in family prayers.** When your family prays before holiday meals you might add in the person who died by simply praying: "We miss \_\_\_\_\_ and know that there's no safer place to be than in God's hands."
7. **Reach out to family or friends.** If you start to have a really difficult time, let someone know and talk about it. Don't expect others to read your mind.
8. **Don't drink away the pain.** It doesn't heal your grief and can lead to other problems.

There are many other healthy ways to deal with grief during the holidays. Whatever you do, remember that there are still good and beautiful things in this world. Be kind and patient with yourself. God is with you and will help to see you through.

## *An Invitation Worth Accepting*

*“You are cordially invited. . .” “Mr. & Mrs. Smith request the pleasure of your company in celebrating. . .” “Save the date. . .”*

We all know the warm feeling of affirmation that (usually) accompanies the receipt of some type of invitation or alert that an invitation is to follow. Someone, somewhere has deemed our being, our presence, to be a positive addition to some type of celebration or get-together. What a lovely gift to receive! Hopefully, our response to same is just as much a gift to the sender of the invitation.

How many of us remind ourselves of the ongoing invitation that God issues to us each day of our lives? He invites us to establish, maintain and enjoy a close relationship with Him through all our joys and sorrows. He offers us all that we are and all that we have to help us to be greater than our world expects us to be.

God gives more to the relationship than we are capable of giving, and He asks only that we do our best to remain close to Him. He has offered us His only-begotten Son, *the Way, the Truth and the Life*, to ensure our ability to attain eternal life with Him in His Kingdom of Heaven, and all we truly need to do is to focus on the importance of God in our lives. If we keep that focus, everything else will fall into place for us.

He offers us His Church, begun by His Son (Who sacrificed so much just to ascertain that we could live forever in His Father’s Kingdom), His sacraments (to provide the grace needed to surmount the obstacles of this world) and His unending mercy and love.

The sad part is that another entity desires to derail us in our journey toward our Creator, and uses our human condition to distract us from our eternal goal. This entity feeds our egos (which consequently, demand that God be relegated to less than first place in our lives) and our fears and insecurities (which erode our trust in our Creator to provide for us); it lures us with earthly pleasure, comfort, and entertainment, which are not evil in and of themselves, unless they are permitted to get in the way of our relationship with God.

How do we ensure that our pilgrimage will result in the desired destination? Through imitation of holy people who have gone before us, the saints of Heaven, especially through perseverance in prayer, focusing when participating in Mass, and making prudent daily-life choices in keeping with the truths of our faith. Sometimes this proves to be more challenging and less convenient than is comfortable for us, but Saint Theresa of Calcutta reminds us that:

*A sacrifice to be real must cost,  
must hurt, must empty ourselves.*

By her own living witness, Saint Theresa reminds us that following God’s will means sacrificing oneself, and that such sacrifice, a type of suffering, helps to purify and sanctify us. How edifying to be invited to be part of such holiness! This is the perfect time of year to reflect on how we are responding to God’s invitation, and to enlist the support of the saints and angels in Heaven in our efforts.

God be with you in all that you do.

## Saint James School News



Dear St. James Parishioners,

In June of 2015, I had the privilege of traveling on pilgrimage to the Holy Land with four other St. James staff members. One of the true highlights of that experience for me personally was standing in the shallows of the Sea of Galilee at the spot where Jesus called St. James to follow Him. Not only was it hard to fathom standing at the foot of a small waterfall where some 2,000 years ago St. James would clean out his fishing nets, but I was overwhelmed with the feeling that Jesus was calling me as well to come follow Him. My journey with our school since then has been nothing short of amazing.



This year, the journey took a leap forward as we began our full staff's involvement with the School of Faith program. Each month, our staff gathers to deepen our faith and strengthen our relationship with Jesus. During a three-hour session facilitated by a spiritual leader of the School of Faith staff, we have time to pray, reflect, discuss, and study our faith. In these sessions, we discover ways to build relationships with those around us in order to help share the faith. We are also learning a better understanding of what the Church teaches and why we believe what we do. We spend time in small groups in Bible study. We read a passage, discuss it, and figure out how this applies in our lives. And finally, we pray. We spend time in quiet reflection in a variety of prayer methods to find out what God is calling us to do.

Next summer, I hope to be able to send additional staff members on pilgrimage to the Holy Land to have that same life changing experience I had. This is a key component of the School of Faith program as our teachers can immerse themselves in the life of Christ.

It is my hope and prayer that the time we are devoting to the School of Faith program will not only impact and change the lives of our staff, but ultimately that we become better role models of the faith for our students. By strengthening our relationship with Jesus we will be better equipped with the knowledge of how to get our students to embrace Christ in their lives. I ask that you keep us in your prayers as we do this important work in our journey of faith.

We are quickly approaching the time of year when parents begin to consider what sort of school community they'd like for their child for the 2017-2018 school year. Do you know someone who will be making decisions about their child's education soon? Please remember that word of mouth is the best marketing for our school. 

## Sports Ministry at St. James:

### It's About Having Our Faith On Top

Can faith and sports be a winning combination for our kids at St. James? The Pope says "Yes." Pope John Paul II created the Pontifical Council for the Laity's Church and Sports Section in 2004 for a number of reasons, including supporting initiatives that encourage Christian witness in sports. Pope Francis has continued the initiative, sending Dr. Santiago Perez de Camino, head of his Church and Sports Section, to the U.S. to speak in 2016.

The Archdiocese of Cincinnati also says "Yes." After promulgating its "Charter on Catholic Youth Sports in March 2014," the Archdiocese supported a first-of-its kind conference – the Director of Sports Ministry Conference – locally at the Athenaeum on March 30 – April 1. Dr. Perez de Camino traveled from Europe to speak for the Holy Father at the conference. He was joined by Archbishop Dennis Schnurr, other bishops, athletic directors, and coaches who seek to inspire renewed emphasis on how faith and sports can become a winning combination for young athletes.

The Conference was organized by the Louisville based SportsLeader organization, which has been working to instill values in athletes since 2004. A goal of the conference was to promote a new position in each Catholic institution with sports teams – a Director of Sports Ministry. The Archdiocese similarly requests parishes to have a spiritual liaison for its sports programs.

St. James also says "Yes." Even beyond the required seasonal coaches' meetings under the Youth Sports Charter, our parish and athletic club sponsored the authors of this article to attend the 3-day sports ministry conference last Spring. Each of our baseball teams then enjoyed an opening day ceremony at St. James field, with both teams and

all the fans participating in public prayer followed by our national anthem before the first pitch. (Yes, we were leaders in making pre-game ceremonies relevant -- in a positive, faith-based way -- before pre-game activity became national news.)

Then on May 15, our young athletes not only attended a Sports Mass together, but also participated in the parish food drive, where Scouts assisted the parish with distribution to needy families through local St. Vincent de Paul food pantries. The youngest athletes enjoyed the Children's Liturgy, which our dedicated volunteers provide every Sunday at our 10am Mass.

The reason for sports ministry initiative is simple, said Mike Orlando, Director of Sports Ministry at McNicholas High School and speaker at the conference: "(It's about) having our religion, our faith, on top. Everything else just falls into place."
